

e-patches & crests MYSTERY AGES: 5-6

Goal: To introduce them to the thrill of mysteries.

Prep Time: 20 minutes

OPENING

- Ask the group if they've ever read a mystery/if they know what a mystery is about.
- Books like Encyclopaedia Brown, Harriet the Spy, The Eleventh Hour: A Curious Mystery by Graeme Base, the Nancy Drew series, the Hardy Boys series, or even the Boxcar Children series are good mystery books for young children and ones you can suggest to the group if they want to explore the thrill of mysteries further.
- Read a mystery story to them—either the whole thing or split it into two parts and read the ending at closing time. Encyclopaedia Brown books are usually split in several shorter stories that would be ideal in length for your meeting.
- If there are a lot of kids, break up the activities into 3 stations.

ACTIVITIES

SECRET INVISIBLE INK

Materials:

- Lemons/Lemon juice
- Sunlight, lightbulb, or other suitable heat source
- Paper
- Paintbrush or cotton swabs
- If using lemons, squeeze them to collect their juice. Otherwise, simply pour lemon juice into bowl or other container that a paintbrush or cotton swab can be dipped into.
- Have the kids dip paintbrushes or cotton swabs into lemon juice and use it to write their message onto the paper.
- Allow paper to dry for several minutes. Once dry, have them hold the paper up to the lightbulb or other heat source. The heat will dry the ink into a pale brown and voila, your invisible message becomes visible!

MYSTERY BOX ACTIVITY

Materials:

- Boxes
- Seashells
- Rocks
- Jello/jelly
- Cut hand-sized holds out into the boxes.
- Cold spaghetti
- Other items with distinctive textures
- Place various items into each box.

Have the kids reach into the box and try and determine what's inside by touch alone.

CRAFTS

YOUR OWN DETECTIVE BADGE

Materials:

- Slips of paper
- Pens/Pencils/Pencil Crayons/Markers
- Plastic Badge Sleeves
- Hole punch (optional)
- Lanyards (optional)
- Before the meeting, trim the slips of paper so that they will be able to fit snugly inside the plastic badge sleeves.
- Optional: if including lanyards, use the hole punch to punch a hole into the plastic badge sleeve where the lanyard can be attached.

Have each child write or help them write their detective name (ie. Detective Chris, Detective Inspector Erin, etc) on the paper and decorate as they see fit.

When the group is done decorating, help them slide their badge into the badge sleeve.

CLOSING

- Finish the mystery story.
- Enjoy your usual closing!
